A word from Louise......



Such is the nature of ministry that I am writing this letter at the end of February but aware that we will be in Lent and looking ahead to Easter by the time it comes to print. Storm 'Dudley' is about to arrive (and if you can hear that name without thinking of Harry Potter good for you) and mountains are figuring a lot in our readings as we prepare for the feast of the transfiguration. Go up to the mountain and behold you will meet God. It set me thinking.

I belong to the Lancashire Climbing & Caving Club we own a hut in the Lake District, half way up the bridle path from the village of Torver to the Old Man of Coniston, a fairly small mountain.

I have walked up that bridle path, to where it meets the Walna scar road. It's what remains of an old track that was used by copper and slate miners of old, to walk from Coniston to the Duddon valley. It skirts under the mountain. The track has been well used, it is rutted and worn down by the many feet that have trodden that way for years. Did they ever look up at the mountain that they are walking around?

There is a little pathway signposted up the mountain. Now I have walked the Walna scar track many times; in bad weather, just heading for Coniston and a coffee shop or pub, in better weather heading the other way to the climbing locations of Dow Crag and Wallowbarrow, if it is pouring down, quite often I fail to even notice the little pathway going up the mountain.

But there have been occasions I have walked up to the top, in good weather, you can see for miles, the whole of the south Lake District spread out before you, it is a wonderful experience. And quite understandable why some people say they feel closer to God in amongst the natural environment.

The pathway up the mountain is quite a challenge to walk, the first time I went up with a group of friends, after a while I got more confident, I did some training to lead parties of scouts.

Our journey of discipleship is much like the journey up the mountain. Before we came to faith we walked past, without noticing the entrance, like the workers, treading the Walna scar track day after day, we plod along in our own lives. What made us step off the beaten track and head upwards? Maybe someone encouraged us, walked with us the first time, to show us the way, or maybe we picked up the guide book that is our scripture, and chose to set off, to explore. However we first set foot on that pathway, we inherit the responsibility of passing that knowledge on for future generations.

Moses went up the mountain alone. He received from God an amazing gift, the 10 commandments, but he was alone with God for a long time and when he came back down the mountain, the people he was sent to lead had strayed. Jesus took just a few of his disciples up the mountain. Peter, James and John, they had a wonderful experience so good that they wanted to stay on the mountain, but that was not what Jesus wanted for them. The experience was to prepare them for the time to come, a time when he had gone and they were to lead his followers. And so in the footsteps of the Disciples we follow. On a good day we might experience something special. Like Peter, we might wish to build a hut, our church and stay but that is not for us, as Jesus tells us we need to go back down, to serve, to help others, to encourage others to come up the mountain with us. What are the excuses we tell ourselves for not doing so? Is the weather forecast too bad, are we too old and tired, do we not know the way, are we afraid of getting lost, stepping out into the unknown. We are not alone, the risen Christ is with us, and his Holy Spirit will empower us.

How lovely on the mountains are the feet of him who brings good news.

Blessings this joyful Easter tide.





CHURCH COUNCIL NEWS

GOD IN LOVE UNITES US





denomination in Britain to permit same-sex marriages after the Conference voted to change the definition of marriage as set out in the *God in Love Unites Us* report into marriage and relationships.

As a result, same-sex marriage can be permitted within Methodist buildings where the local church council is agreeable and applies for registration to do so. Methodist ministers may preside at same-sex marriage services, but a freedom of conscience clause allows them to opt out of conducting such ceremonies should they so wish.

At the Church Council meeting on 22 February, three resolutions were voted on:

- **1.** To consent to the solemnization of marriages of same-sex couples and resolves to apply to register the building for the solemnization of such marriages.
 - Resolution **agreed** by a majority of 80%.
- To consent to services of blessing for same-sex couples who are already married taking place in a Methodist church building. Resolution agreed unanimously.
- **3. To** resolve that Revd Louise Makin be certified to the Registrar General and the Superintendent Registrar as the Authorised Person to be present at the marriages of same-sex couples. Resolution **agreed** by 80%+.

OTHER NEWS

Those who attended the **General Church Meeting** in the autumn had been invited by Louise to jot down their hopes and fears and future vision for Church Road. She has now collated all the responses received and will soon be sending them out to all those on the email list. She comments that we are 'not lacking in vision'!

Treasurer – Andrew Whitley has indicated his intention to retire from this post in the not-too-distant future. Andrew has held this position for many years and has served the church dutifully as custodian of our finances. Anyone interested in serving in this way should speak to Louise.

The Interim **District Chairman for Lancashire** – to replace Revd Paul Davis when he retires in August – has been announced as Revd Phil Gough, currently Superintendent of the Chorley and Leyland Circuit.

Rev Paul Davis has accepted our invitation to lead our **Church Anniversary** and **Gift Day service on 12**th **June.**

A new **Pastoral Carer** has been appointed – Nancy Steele.

Fuel prices increase – the church will suffer from these increases, like domestic households. Louise asked that people be conscious of this when they book rooms, and ensure that if radiator controls are turned up for their meeting, they are returned to '2' at the end.

Policies for Lone Working, and acceptable use of Social Media and Wi-fi were agreed, and will be circulated. They need to be followed by all!

Bissett, with your key, so that you are able to sign for it.

A fob system for entry to the premises will become operational at the start of April and keyholders will also need to be issued with a fob.

Mayors Visit and Fantastic Fund-raiser Event

Katrina Kelly always knew 22/02/2022 was going to be an important day in her life, it would be her birthday on that day, a date never to be repeated (it reads the same front to back, back to front and upside down! - 22022022). So she set herself a mammoth challenge, to raise £1222 for charity by running 22.2Km, completing 222 press ups and cycling 222Km on an exercise bike all within 12 hours!!

Katrina's mum, Jayne, works for the NHS with patients with mental health issues and has over a number of years worked closely with Wesley's, meeting clients there for coffee and helping them to regain confidence and socialise and several of these, including 5 at the moment, have become volunteers here at Wesley's. So Katrina decided to split any money she raised between her mum's two favourite charities, Wesley's and the Connect Community Choir (which Jayne set up) based at Our Ladies Parish Centre in St Albans Road. Wesley's offered to help on the day by providing a venue, refreshments and any other support needed on the day. At the time of writing this Wednesday, 23/02/22, Katrina had surpassed her target and had raised a total of £2,038 to be split 50/50 with ourselves and the choir.

Wesley's are fortunate in having a number of Councillors, especially Councillor Brenda Blackshaw, supporting us and it was thanks to them we

managed to arrange a visit by the Mayor of Fylde, Councillor Elaine Silverwood to both recognise the work we do and support Katrina in her fund raising challenge. The Mayor visited Our Ladies Parish Centre to watch Katrina doing her 222 press ups whilst being supported by the Community Choir singing rousing songs of encouragement before visiting Wesley's at 12.00noon where she enjoyed lunch and chatted to our customers



and volunteers for an hour before departing. All in all, a great day for everyone concerned.

The needs and demands for the work done in Wesley's grows month on month and will no doubt continue to do so as the economic pressures continue for some of society's most vulnerable groups. Wesley's now operates 5 days per week, Monday, Wednesday, Friday for the larder/foodbank that also serves hot take away soup, with the restaurant is

open Tuesday and Thursday serving over 100 breakfasts and hot 3 course lunches each week together with food preparation and cookery lessons. Our dedicated and talented head chef, Jayne McLaren, under the supervision and guidance of Paul Caddy, is a very busy, brilliant cook and teacher who now leads a superb team of kitchen volunteers.



Fundraising continues to be very important if we are to protect the long term prospects for this project and we are extremely grateful to all who contribute to these efforts especially the local Soroptimist Society, who recently donated a further £5,000, Marie Hawkins, one of our church stewards, who successfully applied for a grant of £4,000 to replace our ovens, one of the local Masonic lodges who donated £210, a private individual who donated £100 and of course Katrina for her amazing effort in raising over £1000 for Wesley's.

It's brilliant to see God's work in action and may God bless all those who work so hard to achieve these amazing results.

From Hanifi, one of the volunteers at Wesley's, in his own words:

"If you ask me what the biggest challenge in your life for an asylum seeker is, I would say: "Living as a burden to others".

I am very happy when I can do something for the benefit of others without being dependent on anyone. I came to England last year; I was a foreigner and did not know how to speak English.

Last year, we met Edyta Paxton, who works for the council. After I stated to Mrs Paxton that I wanted to work as a volunteer, she introduced me to the staff of Wesley Cafe.

First of all, I was afraid if they would treat me with a distance, but I never felt strange at Wesley Cafe. Because the officials and volunteers there spoke to me with the language of the heart. The door of the kitchen and the doors of their heart's wide was opened for me.

To me, Wesley Cafe is not only a place to eat and drink, but also a place where people's social needs are met. People do not consume Fast Food and ready-made foods that threaten our health here. They can eat fresh and healthy food. Thus, they can both test good food and socialize by chatting in this beautiful conversation environment.

The sparkle in their eyes is a sign that they are happy. As a team, we try not only to fill people's stomachs, but also to fill their hearts. Trying to make others happy is actually the greatest source of happiness for us."

Hanifi is refugee who volunteers in Wesley's and it speaks so clearly about what Wesley's does, not only in feeding people but offering real welcoming love and hope to people.

Come and enjoy some springtime fun with other members of the congregation, families and friends this Easter.



TIME OUT UPDATE SPRING 2022

"Time Out is a faith based fellowship group for secondary school aged young people, encouraging them to explore their faith, what it means to them, how it relates to their daily lives and those of the local and worldwide community in which they live".

The autumn term of 2021 seemed to fly by, with the young people rising to the ever changing challenges and rules of covid19 with great resilience and perseverance.

Our first session back after the summer focused largely on planning and engaging the 11 strong group in different aspects of life at Church Road. Reverend Louise met the young people, introduced herself and then left the group to discuss their preferences in relation to worship styles, times and formats of services which was then fed back via the worship planning group.

It was subsequently agreed at Church Council that a young person from Time Out (who has been confirmed as a member of the Methodist Church) would be elected to represent the young people at Church Council meetings alongside the Time Out leaders. We were delighted that Sophie Hird agreed to be our first elected member and we thank her for her commitment to this role.

We recruited volunteers to be added to the Sunday morning reading rota, the coffee rota and discussed topics they wished to address and projects they would like to tackle in relation to social justice over the winter / spring term.



Over the winter term, we then tackled topics ranging from the "advantages and disadvantages of social media in worship and evangelism", to Toilet Twinning (see our separate article) and Advent Bible Journaling – some of



you may have seen their artwork during worship or via the church facebook page / website in December.

The planning and roll out of the Christingle Chocolate Orange Appeal quickly followed and the group were thrilled that with the support of the congregation, family and friends, we were able to prepare 200 chocolate oranges with a Christingle message from all at Church Road and an invitation to join us at our annual Christingle Service. These were distributed via Wesleys larder during the two weeks leading up to Christmas and as we were blessed with an abundance




of chocolate oranges, the remainder were distributed to our local neighbours following the Christingle service as we passed the light on Christmas Eve.

We started the New Year with an evening based on the Covenant and the Methodist Covenant Prayer, quickly followed by a movie night as we explored Gods unconditional love. Forthcoming evenings will focus on creation and Bible Journaling in Lent - keep an eye out for their next creative expressions of their faith!

Sadly due to ongoing covid restrictions (coupled with exam revision for some), our proposed weekend residential was put on the back burner.

However, we have been thrilled that in addition to our regular Time Out meetings, we have been able to launch the Youth Alpha course with the newer, younger members of the group. Five young people have been regularly attending and actively engaging with the course programme. We hope and pray that this may act as a stepping stone in their faith journey, with the potential to explore church membership with Reverend Louise following on from this.



We ask for your continued prayers, support and encouragement for these wonderful young people, the projects they are engaging in and the people these support as well as their own ongoing faith journey as active members of the Church Road family.

Christian Aid Week Appeal 15 - 21 May 2022

Christian Aid is a charity who work with 700 local organisations in around 50 countries in the world. They help poor communities and enable them to deal with hardships, from climate change and the possible threat of natural disasters. Alongside this, Christian Aid also help with the education, sanitation, health, and reconciliation of certain communities.

Christian Aid Week began in 1957, with the aim to encourage public awareness, this led to the Charity adopting the name Christian Aid in 1964. Its aim in the 1960s was to make people aware of the threat of hunger and the possibility of famine.

In 2022, Christian Aid Week will take place from 15th to 21st May.

This year Christian Aid Week will focus on the plight of drought which numerous countries around the world face. It recognises that droughts have become more intense and more common because of the changing climate. The impact on the world population is great, as it means that millions of people around the world struggle to get the food and water that they need.

Because of the continuing Coronavirus pandemic Christian Aid Week this year will be a virtual affair. Christian Aid is asking volunteers to host virtual fundraising events such as online bingo, or an online quiz that they are calling Quiztian Aid.

Another suggestion from Christian Aid is that people sign up for their 300,000 steps challenge.
